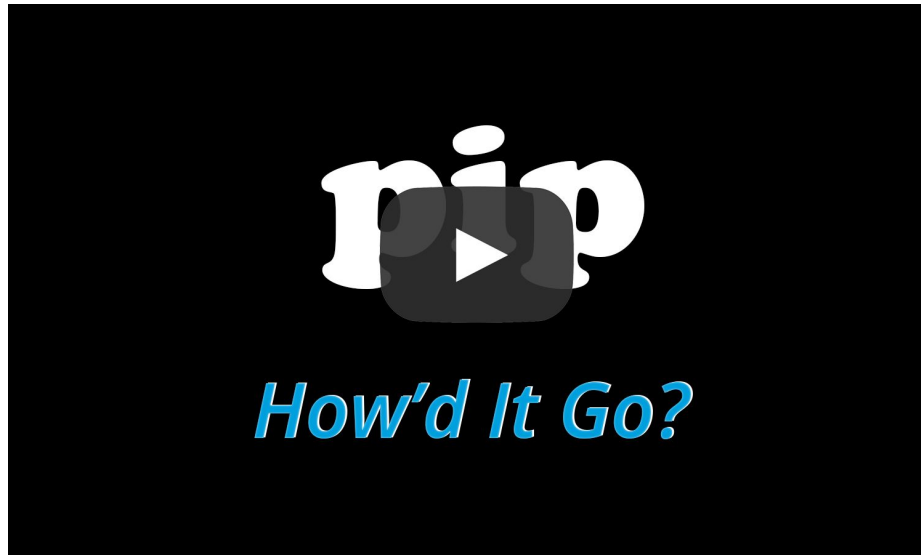


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How'd It Go?

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You must answer these first three questions.

1. What are you most proud of in this project?
